

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Eight days after Easter, Doubting Thomas has an encounter with the Risen Christ that makes him a believer and even more, an apostle or ambassador who will bring the Gospel to an unbelieving world. That should give us hope that the Risen Christ will do the same with us.



All the disciples were huddling together behind locked doors, hoping that the authorities would be satisfied with the blood of their master and leave them alone. All but one. We don't know where Thomas was, but all we know is that he missed it. Despite the locked doors, Jesus suddenly appears, glorious in their midst, bringing peace where there had been only fear. Instead of rebuking them for cowardice, He breathes upon them the Spirit of mercy and commissions them to be ambassadors, indeed instruments, of His Divine mercy. At last they are truly "apostles," for they are "sent out," like Jesus, the original Apostle, who was sent forth by the Father for the forgiveness of sins. Sinners, called to bring other sinners the Good News of mercy. Here they are, sinners, called to console others with the same consolation that they have received from the One without sin.

They couldn't believe that Thomas missed this encounter and couldn't wait to tell him the news. But Thomas stubbornly refused to believe that it was anything more than a mirage. For everyone knows that death is final. Never mind Jesus' many puzzling predictions about "raising up this temple in three days." Never mind the fact that all of his fellow apostles save Judas were there and swore they saw His wounds. Thomas proudly insisted on empirical evidence that he could personally inspect to his own satisfaction. So eight days later the Master once again defies the barred doors and appears in their midst. This time Thomas is present. Imagine the look on his face as his eyes meet the eyes of Jesus. Talking about wanting to crawl under the nearest rock! Jesus invites him to sate his appetite for proof and probe His wounds. Thomas decides not to explain, not to defend, but simply to surrender. He is asked to believe that His master is risen. But he rises to the occasion to confess even more-that His master is not just risen Lord, but eternal God. Thomas' confession of Jesus' divinity can be seen as the climax, the punch-line, of the entire Gospel of John, a fitting confirmation of its very first verse: "the Word was with God and the Word was God" (John 1:1). Faith now has overcome fear. It will soon overcome the world.

Faith has this sort of power because it is a supernatural gift. It was the Spirit that Jesus breathed on them that Easter afternoon that had empowered the ten to believe and become ambassadors of faith and mercy. Without that same Spirit, Thomas was powerless to believe. But once the breath of the Risen One unfroze his hard heart, Thomas too could experience the joy of faith and assume his God-appointed task to be one of the foundation stones of the new temple of God, the Church. This temple, formed by living stones, was a compelling testimony indeed. The pagans are reported to have remarked "see how these Christians love one another." For they were a community of people who appeared to have one heart and one mind (Acts 4:32-35). They even shared their material resources so that none would be in need. This unity flowed from their one faith.

Thomas was once known as the doubter. But he and his fellow doubters came to be called "the believers." That should give us hope. If we desire it, the Spirit will strengthen the drooping hands and weak knees of our own imperfect faith to make us effective ambassadors to a skeptical world.

Indeed, he got what he wanted. Jesus appeared to them again flesh and blood but in a glorified body. Now they wanted to know where the master would be leading them. Jesus had done most of his part. The Holy Spirit would come and would lead the way, on to the road of the mission. Jesus would be sending his disciples to the whole world. It was not an ordinary task. Countless trials would come along the way and these disciples would make disciples and ultimately like the master they too would offer their lives in sacrifice.

"Peace be with You," says the Lord to us too. When our lives and the lives of most people around the world are in danger and the future is uncertain, Jesus says to us, "Peace be with you." It is not just a form of a greeting, but it is what the Lord wants us to be. The Lord assures us that he is in control of everything and we have to put our faith and trust in his Mighty hands. Amen.



Happy Easter!

For the 50 days of the Easter season we celebrate the joy of Jesus' Resurrection. Try one or all of these 10 ways to harness Easter joy each day:



- 1. Begin each day by thanking God for all the good things in your life.
- 2. Give God all of your fears and worries.
- 3. Offer up the suffering and disappointments your experience.
- 4. Do something nice for someone.
- 5. Be a forgiving person. Let go of anger and resentments that drag down your spirit.
- 6. Take a moment to appreciate the beauty of the emerging springtime.
- 7. Don't be afraid to make mistakes. Learn to laugh at yourself.
- 8. Find ways to show family members and friends how much you appreciate them.
- 9. Try to live more simply. Clear out material possessions that are not essential to your happiness.
- 10. End each day by thanking God for all the good things in your life.

The Divine Mercy Image of JESUS is not another ordinary holy picture of JESUS. It is

an image that JESUS Himself revealed to St. Faustina and commanded her to have it painted. JESUS promised many graces to those who venerate this image and wanted it made known throughout the whole world.

On February 22, 1931, St. Faustina wrote (Diary Notes 47-48)

"In the evening, when I was in my cell, I saw the Lord Jesus clothed in a white garment. One hand [was] raised in the gesture of blessing; the other was touching the garment at the breast. From beneath the garment, slightly drawn aside at the breast, there were emanating two large rays, one red, the other pale. In silence I kept my gaze fixed on the Lord; my soul was struck with awe, but also with great joy.



After a while, Jesus said to me, 'Paint an image according to the pattern you see, with the signature: Jesus, I trust in You. I desire that this image be venerated, first in your chapel, and [then] throughout the world. I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I also promise victory over [its] enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death. I Myself will defend it as My own glory.'

JESUS also told her: "I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy... That vessel is this image with the signature: 'Jesus, I trust in You,' " (Diary Note 327).

Sometime later, St. Faustina's Confessor told her to ask the Lord Jesus the meaning of the two rays in the image, (Diary Note 77). St. Faustina wrote in her note book, "During prayer I heard these words within me: The two rays denote Blood and Water....The pale ray stands for the Water which makes souls righteous... The red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of souls...These two rays issued forth from the very depths of My tender mercy when My agonized Heart was opened by a lance on the Cross."

On another occasion, JESUS told St. Faustina: "My gaze from this image is like My gaze from the cross. ... Mankind will not have peace until it turns with trust to My Mercy." (Diary Note 299)

Sometime before the first Sunday after Easter – April 1935. JESUS had told her, "I desire that this image be displayed in public on the first Sunday after Easter..... That Sunday is the Feast of Mercy..... Through the Word Incarnate I make known the bottomless depth of My mercy."

St. Faustina later wrote in her Diary, 'Strangely, all things came about just as the Lord had requested. In fact, it was on the first Sunday after Easter [April, 1935] that the image was publicly honored by crowds of people for the first time. For three days it was exposed and received public veneration.... during these three days, the Redemption of the World was being celebrated, marking the nineteen hundred years that have passed since the Passion of our Savior. I see now that the work of Redemption is bound up with the work of mercy requested by the Lord.'

On another occasion, JESUS told her: "Not in the beauty of the color, nor of the brush lies the greatness of this image, but in My grace."

We live in one of the darkest ages of great sin, wickedness, cruelty, selfishness and great rejection of the love and the law of God and JESUS has revealed the image of Divine Mercy that bore the wounds He revealed to His Apostles in the Cenacle – Apostles who were fearful of persecution and rejection and who were weak in their faith. "If you do not believe my words, at least believe my wounds" (Diary Note 379). He revealed Himself with the signs of His passion – an act of the immense mercy of God, but also one that manifests resurrection and triumph over evil.

What does it mean to discern a vocation?

The word vocation comes from the Latin word *vocare*, meaning "to call." A vocation is a calling or invitation from God to serve in a particular way. For Catholics, that calling might be as a priest, sister, or married person. Vocation is the way we respond to the invitation to share in God's grace and witness to God's love in the world.



Discerning a vocation is the process in which we pray for God's guidance. We listen for God's message that is often quiet and unassuming in a world filled with noise and distractions. We look at our gifts and talents, seek the advice of others, examine our motives, and listen to see what God is asking of us. The goal of discernment is to follow what the Lord wills, not what we think is the best idea. Many men enter a seminary to discern if that is their vocation, only to discover that their calling is to marriage. Others have resisted the idea for long periods of time, until finally they could resist no more. Some great saints have described that dilemma. Vocation is a human process of divine origin, and each of us must strive constantly to hear the call of God in our lives.

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
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
