

What's my line? Back in the 1950s there was a popular TV quiz show called What's My Line? Four celebrity panelists would each ask questions until

The disciples heard this and were told by Jesus not to tell anyone that he was the Christ. We hear the same message today. But the roles have changed. We are to preach to all who will hear that Jesus is the Christ.

Peter's act of faith in this week's Gospel was the beginning of the church. It is in the church, the body of the faithful, that we come to Christ. In this church, the leaders are the successors of the apostles. They teach and govern and try to show the way to God. Jesus gives them the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and he gives them and us the guidance of the Spirit. This is how we come to Christ: with others, the members of His body.

God calls each of us by name; and like Peter, we must answer the question, "Who do you say that I am?" But we are never alone in our faith; we are always with others. The church is made up of people—limited, imperfect people like you and me. It's too messy for some people who try to go it alone. We Americans are a very individualistic people. Some have called us a nation of lone rangers, even when we do religion. But that's not our way. This is where we find God, here in this church, among these people. Here we listen to his word; here he gives himself to us in amazing intimacy, in Holy Communion. From here we go forth, strengthened by the Bread of Life, to try to live as if we believe what we say: that Jesus is the messiah, the son of the living God.

Truths of Our Catholic Faith

Jewish people of Jesus' time were waiting for the Christ, the Messiah, the Anointed One. They weren't in complete agreement among themselves exactly what the Christ would be like, but they knew that God was sending them someone very special.

Peter makes the connection that this Christ is somehow on the same level as God almighty. This mystery forms the basis of a whole religion, Christianity. Christians believe that Jesus, the Son of God, is THE Anointed One, the promised Messiah, the Christ.

The title "Christ" means "Anointed One" (Messiah). Jesus is the Christ, for "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power" (Acts 10:38). He was the one "who is to come" (Lk 7:19), the object of "the hope of Israel" (Acts 28:20). (CCC 453)



To say that Jesus gives Peter tremendous power and authority is an understatement. Had Jesus not modeled the way that power needs to be used—in service of others, spiritually even more so than physically—the thought of Him giving such power to one man might be frightening.

Catholics take comfort in knowing that one man—a man, yes, but a man

guided in an entirely unique way by the Holy Spirit—has been entrusted by our Church's founder with the authority to shepherd souls toward the heavenly pasture. Flesh and blood have not so endowed the successor of Peter, the Bishop of Rome, but rather this arrangement is instituted by our heavenly Father.

The Pope enjoys, by divine institution, "supreme, full, immediate, and universal power in the care of souls." (CCC 937)

Register online NOW for CONFIRMATION 1 AND 2 CLASSES



Active participation in weekly sessions is required. It is two years of preparation. The first year focuses on giving teens a solid foundation in the Catholic faith. Attendance is taken and teens must have their camera on during Zoom sessions to be counted.

The only way to know God is to love God. Our minds will never fully grasp the mystery of God, but our hearts and souls can learn to love the mystery. Years ago, when life had a more innocent quality to it, we believed what we were told or witnessed, unless there was direct evidence otherwise. This was especially true if the information came from someone in authority. In a sense, we were a bit more gullible on one hand but also more trusting on the other. The latter is an admirable quality that sadly can be eroded when we realize we have been duped. With education and technological advances, we find ourselves more skeptical and less likely to too quickly

accept and believe what we see and hear.

For all of the good that social media can do, it can also easily distort reality and truth. Photoshop and a myriad other technological truths can add to, fabricate, and make even the non-existent seem real. It is amazing. How far do we allow this obviously justifiable skepticism to take us? Questioning and doubting are healthy elements of any good relationship as long as we don't allow them to turn us away from a deeper experience of love and encounter. If we cannot get our minds around something or empirically justify or prove it, we tend to declare it a hoax, untrue, or unauthentic and walk away. The very same trust that can quickly be eroded is exactly what is essential for all of our relationships, especially our relationship with God. With all things and people that make a profound claim on us, we have to trust in the absence of knowledge. Full self-investment involves plunging completely into the unknown!

Simon Peter said to Jesus, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Peter came to this knowledge, which is not "head knowledge" because of the relationship he shared with Jesus and what God was able to reveal in and through that relationship. Peter simply "knew" because of love that this is who Jesus really is. The silent exchange of love between friends, and not an intellectual exercise of the mind, brought Peter to this place. When we stop and think about it, there are many things in life that we simply know but do not completely understand. When someone sacrifices their own well-being for another, it may not make intellectual sense when examined. But it makes a world of sense when it is carried out. The vastness of reality and an encounter with incomprehensible mystery all lead us to profound silence where we simply know something to be true. Have you trusted enough to allow your relationship with God to bring you to this place or are you still too skeptical?

A poem describes six blind people wondering what an elephant looks like. One feels the animals side and says "It looks like a wall." Another feels the elephant's legs and says, "It looks like a tree trunk," and so on. Some people say, "When it comes to God, the various religions of the world are like the blind people in the poem. Each is partly in the right and partly in the wrong."

Jesus said, "Whoever has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:9).

If Jesus was who he said he was, then Christianity does, indeed, possess a privileged, personal knowledge of God and God's will.

Father, you created me and put me on earth for a purpose. Jesus, you died for me and called me to complete your work. Holy Spirit, you help me to carry out the work for which I was created and called. In your presence and name—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—I call on you to guide my thoughts, inspiration and actions. May they all have their origin in you and be directed to your glory. Amen.

En la década de 50s trasmitían un programa popular de televisión llamado ¿Cuál es mi lí-


