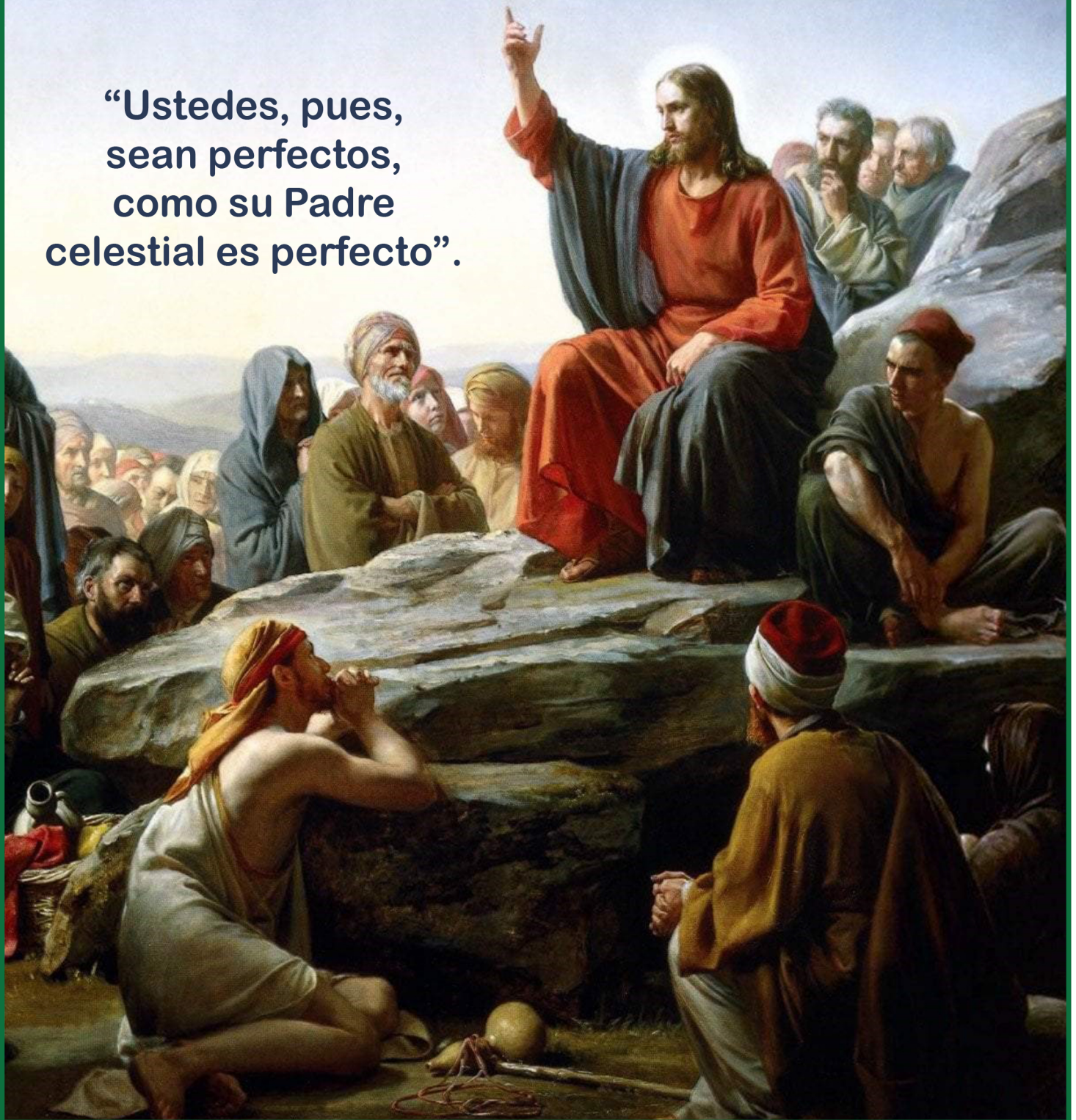


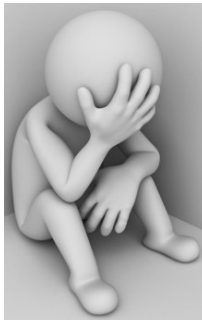

The Gospels continue to challenge us to the core. This is especially true in the way our social relationships have developed. Feeling safe and secure in the world are not things that come easily these days. Actually, we may find ourselves feeling more reservation, caution, reluctance, and fear than ever before. In a moment's notice, life can drastically change. When someone has been intentionally and violently hurt,

especially someone we love, we can all too easily find ourselves very attracted to the Old Testament philosophy of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth."

Intellectually, we know this is not what Jesus wants us to do. But on some level it just seems to make practical or even political sense. After all, why should we allow someone to get away with a heinously violent act? Yet, Jesus cannot be any clearer than he is with this! Offer no resistance to one who is evil. Turn the other cheek as well. When pressed into service, go two miles. Do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow. Love your enemies. Now, take a moment to reflect on all of this. Consider a horrible act of violence committed against someone you love. Listen. Think. Be honest. Can you do as Jesus directs?

We want to be holy. But we are more comfortable with a definition of holiness that can keep us saying our prayers and on our knees in church. We are not comfortable with a definition of holiness that has something to say about to how we react to and negotiate life. We like to keep a sharp and strong line between the secular and the sacred. In fact, we would prefer that the doors between them be kept closed. God wants us to be holy as He is holy. If God sees this one way and we see it another, then where does this leave us on our journey to God?

Our minds like the practical, worldly, and secular answers to things. They are more black and white and at first glance appear to make more sense. Holiness wells up from our souls and is beyond reason. It cannot be explained. It is something we just simply know comes as a result of deep prayer. The truly contemplative eye knows inwardly that what Jesus asks is true and then willingly does it. It may not be easy.

The Jews in Jesus' time were keen on works of charity, but charity to their own. For them the commandment "love your neighbor" meant to love their fellow Jew. Few felt any obligation to non-Jews. Jesus wanted to change that kind of mentality. He said to his disciples, *"I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."* (John 13:14)



For Jesus, his followers must do far more than the commandment requires not just loving neighbor or strangers but even enemies. This had never been heard before. In the parable of "the good Samaritan" Jesus taught his disciples who could be our neighbor. Anyone who needs any assistance is a neighbor, but who could also be our enemy. In the Gospel an "enemy" refers to people not only who are fiercely hostile but also those who are merely unfriendly.

Jesus, indeed, came to fulfil the law and the prophets and not to abolish them. For the Lord, it is not enough to "not kill" the enemy but even to love him or her. The question of forgiveness will always arise especially in the most crucial moments of relationship. Jesus talked about the need to forgive not just seven times but seventy times seven times. Jesus recognized that this is not an easy task that is why he taught us to pray, *"Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us."* Jesus also gave us the example of forgiveness from the cross: *"Father, forgive them for they do not know what they do."*

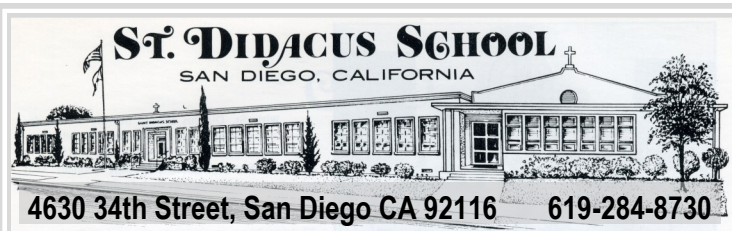

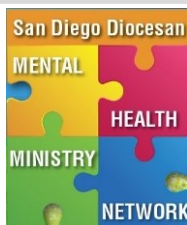
And the special intentions in our Book of Needs

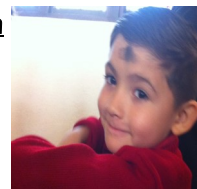


Vocation Discernment Weekend

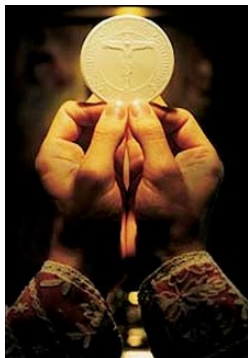

Rite of Election — Sunday, March 1st

At the *Rite of Election* those in our RCIA program along with those in RCIA throughout the Diocese will affirm their intention to join the Church. The Church makes its "election" of the catechumens to receive the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Eucharist, Confirmation) at the Easter Vigil. In the presence of the bishop they write their names in the Book of the Elect as a pledge of fidelity. They are now called "the elect" and begin a Period of Purification and Enlightenment for the remainder of Lent. Keep them in your prayers as they continue their preparation to receive the sacraments at the Easter Vigil.



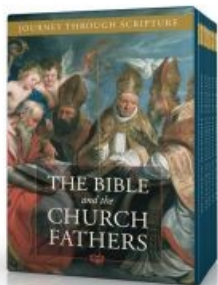
Guidelines for Fasting & Abstinence During Lent



Abstinence is a penitential practice consisting of refraining from the consumption of meat and is to be observed by all Catholics who are 14 years of age and older. Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and the Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence.

In addition to abstinence, fasting is to be observed by all Catholics between the ages of 18-59 (inclusive). On days of fasting, one full meal is allowed. Two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed. Note: If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, they are urged to practice other forms of self-denial that are suitable to their condition.

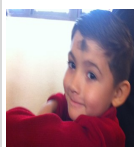

No tendremos catecismo el miércoles 26 de febrero. Los estudiantes deberán asistir con sus familias a las celebraciones del Miércoles de Ceniza. **Regresaremos a clases el miércoles, 4 de marzo en el salón parroquial, donde tendremos una reunión para padres e hijos, obligatoria sobre Cuaresma.**

Los judíos en la época de Jesús estaban interesados en obras de caridad, pero solo para los suyos. Para ellos, el mandamiento "ama a tu prójimo" significaba amar a su prójimo judío. Pocos sentían alguna obligación de ayudar a los no judíos. Jesús quería cambiar ese tipo de mentalidad. Él les dijo a sus discípulos: *"Les doy un nuevo mandamiento: amarse unos a otros. Como yo los he amado, también deberías amarte el uno al otro. Así es como todos sabrán que ustedes son mis discípulos, si se aman los unos a los otros"* (Juan 13:14).



Para Jesús, sus seguidores deben hacer mucho más de lo que el mandamiento requiere no solo amar al prójimo o a los extraños, sino incluso a los enemigos. Esto nunca se había escuchado antes. En la parábola del "buen samaritano" Jesús enseñó a sus discípulos quién podría ser nuestro prójimo. Cualquiera que necesite ayuda es un vecino, pero que podría ser nuestro enemigo. En el Evangelio, un "enemigo" se refiere a una persona que no solo es ferozmente hostiles sino también a aquellos que simplemente son hostiles.

Jesús, de hecho, vino para cumplir la ley y los profetas y no para abolirlos. Para el Señor, no es suficiente "no matar" al enemigo sino incluso amarlo. La cuestión del perdón siempre surgirá, especialmente en los momentos más cruciales de la relación. Jesús habló sobre la necesidad de perdonar no solo siete veces sino setenta veces siete. Jesús reconoció que esta no es una tarea fácil, por eso nos enseñó a orar: *"Perdónanos, así como nosotros perdonamos a los que nos ofenden"*. Jesús también nos dio el ejemplo del perdón de la cruz: *"Padre, perdónalos porque no saben lo que hacen"*.

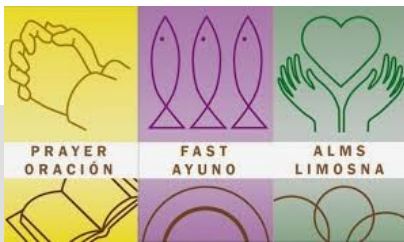
