

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." Very often, having more light is not something we desire as it forces us to confront something we really do not want to see. There

can be comfort found in darkness. It has an eerie sense of security to it. We do not have to challenge ourselves or be challenged and can simply exist in some fabricated state of self-fabricated blissfulness. Jesus came to bring light, and it is a light that is resisted by many and hated by some. It is a light that causes us to see things as they really are and not as we would want or need them to be.

It is no wonder then that Simeon boldly and honestly proclaims to Mary, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." We have to take the Gospel message as it is and not just use those parts that are useful to us or more palatable. Taking Jesus at face value can and will lead to turmoil and dissention. Hearts will be pierced. Whether we like it, Jesus' proclamation of what the world God created really ought to look like has real and absolute social implications.

It has a lot to say about how we treat our brothers and sisters: spiritually, personally, economically, and globally. It has everything to do with the poor, the immigrant, the scared, the unborn, the vulnerable, the sick, and the broken. The light opens us to a challenging, table-turning experience that may not be something we want to see but shows us where we need to be.

Bernadeane Carr, STL, retired director of the Diocesan Institute will be here to talk about the Beatitudes from the point of view of the saints. Let the saints be your guide to living the best life that Jesus wants for you. This is a free event and everyone is welcome to attend.

According to Jewish tradition the customary offering for a first born male was a lamb. Because the family of Jesus could not afford a lamb they were allowed to offer a pair of doves instead. The roots of the ritual of presenting a new born to the Lord at the temple went back to the history of Israel when as a people they were slaves in the land of Egypt. One of the plagues that God



sent to the people of Egypt was the death of every first born male throughout the land. The children of the Jews were saved because of the blood of the lamb. As an act of gratitude for a newly born child and as a way of redeeming the child from God, the parents had to offer a lamb to the temple or in the case of Mary and Joseph they had to offer a pair of doves.

Today, every time we celebrate the Eucharist we offer not any kind of animal but the "lamb of God" our Lord Jesus Christ himself. The priest, acting in the person of Christ, offers Christ to God. Jesus is the victim but at the same time he is the one offering and as a Person in the Divine Trinity, the offering is for him. Jesus is the altar and the sacrifice offered for the atonement of our sins and for the salvation of the whole world. The feast of the Presentation of the Lord reminds us that every child is a gift from God, a very precious gift whose salvation Jesus himself paid a great price for. Let us also remind ourselves that every time the Eucharist is offered, Jesus, the Lamb of God, redeems each of us for himself.



World Day for Consecrated Life February 2, 2020

In 1997, Pope Saint John Paul II instituted a day of prayer for women and men in consecrated life. This celebration is attached to the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on February 2nd. This Feast is also known as Candlemas Day; the day on which candles are blessed symbolizing Christ who is the light of the world. So too, those in

consecrated life are called to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to all peoples.

The celebration of World Day for Consecrated Life is to highlight the gift of consecrated persons for the whole Church.

"This then is the consecrated life: praise which gives joy to God's people, prophetic vision that reveals what counts. Consecrated life is not about survival, it is not about preparing ourselves for ars bene moriendi: this is the temptation of our days, in the face of declining vocations. No, it is not about survival, but new life. "But... there are only a few of us..." – it's about new life. It is a living encounter with the Lord in his people. It is a call to the faithful obedience of daily life and to the unexpected surprises from the Spirit. It is a vision of what we need to embrace in order to experience joy: Jesus."

Laity as Co-Creators of the Franciscan Tradition: Finding Faith as a Lay Franciscan with Darleen Pryds, PhD.

Lay Franciscans can often be forgotten, but they are actually the majority of Franciscan practitioners. We will explore the rich variety of ways in which laity have followed the Franciscan Charism from its inception.

Darleen Pryds has been studying Franciscan laity for over three decades. Her particular contribution to Franciscan studies has been to analyze the tradition of lay preaching as a form of "Somatic Theology" or theology that is expressed through lived experience. You can find her research in many articles and in three books, *The King Embodies the Word: Robert d'Anjou and the Politics of Preaching* (2000); *Women of the Streets: Early Franciscan Women and their Mendicant Vocation* (2010); and *Enduring Presence Authenticity and Diversity among the First Generations of Franciscan Laity* (2018). Las raíces del ritual de presentar un recién nacido al Señor en el templo se remontan a la historia de Israel cuando, como pueblo, eran esclavos en la tierra de Egipto. Una de las plagas que Dios envió al pueblo de Egipto fue la muerte de cada primogénito en toda la tierra. Los hijos de los judíos fueron salvados por la sangre del cordero. Como un acto de gratitud por un varón recién nacido y como una forma de redimir al niño ante Dios, los padres tenían que ofrecer un cordero al templo o, en el caso de María y José, tuvieron que ofrecer un par de palomas.

Hoy, cada vez que celebramos la Eucaristía, no ofrecemos ningún tipo de animales sino el "cordero de Dios", nuestro Señor Jesucristo mismo. El sacerdote, actuando en la persona de Cristo, ofrece a Cristo a Dios. Jesús es la víctima pero al mismo tiempo es la única ofrenda y, como Persona en la Santísima Trinidad, la ofrenda es para él. Jesús es el altar y el sacrificio ofrecido para la expiación de nuestros pecados y para la salvación del mundo entero. La fiesta de la Presentación del Señor nos recuerda que cada niño es un regalo de Dios, un regalo muy valioso que Jesús mismo pagó un gran precio por su salvación. Recordemos también todo lo que se ofrece en la Eucaristía, Jesús, el Cordero de Dios, nos redime a cada uno por sí mismo.


