We are all familiar with the refrain, "You have put on Christ. In him you have been baptized. Alleluia, alleluia!" In Baptism, we "put

It also means that we are not in debt to our past, complete with its sins, failures, regrets, fears, and unfulfilled dreams. There is always hope. They could now have the support of a community, full participation in the sacraments of the church, focus for their disordered lives, consolation, healing, and an understanding of what life is really all about.

Our lives are meant to be celebrations of the Spirit we have received in Baptism. How does that joy get expressed in and through you? When we truly understand that we have put on Christ, our burdens can become much lighter. It is odd that so many Christians look like they are carrying the weight of the world on their shoulders. # A NOTE FROM MRS. DEAN:

We've been given the opportunity to purchase desk shields for each student's desk as we begin the new school year. They'd cover all three sides of the desk, are about 3 feet high, and are made of clear plexiglass, which allows

them to see all the way around the class, just as if there's no shield at all. These would also eliminate the need for the students to wear masks all day in the classroom while they're seated at their desks, which I think is a big plus.

The cost is the only real issue, as they run \$50 each; we would need about 175 total, depending on what our enrollment numbers are in the fall.

I think we need to look into purchasing these shields, if for no other reason than to make things easier on our students and teachers while everyone's in the classroom. I know that not everyone is in a financial position to help at this time, but if anyone is able to donate enough to buy one, or ten, or an entire classroom supply (!), or however many you can, we would be most appreciative.

If you're able to commit to making any form of donation for these shields, please email me and let me know as soon as possible so I can order them in time to get them here before the start of the new school year. They're made locally by a Catholic school teacher in Poway, and he says he has enough for us but his supply is getting low, so if we want them, we'll need to move quickly.

# The Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Why do priests kiss the altar at the start of Mass?

Our churches and chapels are filled with symbols. We might think of the more common symbols (like the crucifix, statues, stained-glass windows, vestment color and altar cloths) as well as major symbols (such as the paschal candle and the baptismal font). But there are some things that we can take for granted in our sacred spaces, because unfortunately, they seem to just be part of the building, including three of the main symbols of our liturgy: the ambo (lectern), the chair for the priest celebrant, and the altar.

These three objects are placed in a specially designated area called the sanctuary. They are the places where the Word of God is proclaimed, where the priest prays and presides at the celebration, and where the bread and wine are offered by the priest during the Eucharistic Prayer. Although each of these objects is sacred because of the role they play in our worship, the altar holds a special place. In a document containing the rules and instructions for the Mass — the "General Instruction of the Roman Missal" - we read: "The altar on which the Sacrifice of the Cross is made present under sacramental signs is also the table of the Lord to which the People of God is called together to participate in the Mass, as well as the center of the thanksgiving that is accomplished throughout the Eucharist" (no. 296).

One of the ways that we recognize the importance of the altar is when the priest and deacon kiss the altar at the beginning of Mass. Kissing is an ancient act of devotion. Remember, we also kiss the cross on Good Friday, and the deacon or priest kisses the "Book of the Gospels" after the Gospel is proclaimed. This act of devotion reminds us that the altar is a symbol of Jesus, the "living stone" (see 1 Peter 2:4), the foundation stone of our faith. It is a symbol gesture, but it is a powerful reminder of the One on whom our faith is built and in whose name we gather as the "household of faith" (see Galatians 6:10). ©LPi

# Pope Francis has approved the inclusion of three additional invocations in the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary, also called the Litany of Loreto.

In a June 20 letter to the presidents of bishops' conferences, Cardinal Robert Sarah, prefect of the Congregation for the Divine Liturgy and the Discipline of the Sacraments, said the invocations "Mater misericordiae," "Mater spei," and "Solacium migrantium" should be inserted in the Marian litany. "The titles and invocations which Christian piety has reserved for the Virgin Mary over the course of the centuries, as the privileged and sure way



to an encounter with Christ, are innumerable," Sarah wrote.

"Even in this present moment which is marked by feelings of uncertainty and trepidation, devout recourse to her, which is full of affection and trust, is deeply felt by the People of God," the cardinal continued. Sarah said Pope Francis welcomed people's desire to include these invocations in the formulary of the litany. The Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary, also known as the Litany of Loreto, has been an approved prayer for the intercession of Mary by the Church since the late 16th century, with its usage recorded even prior. It consists of the recitation of formal and informal titles of Mary, followed by the request to Mary to "pray for us." The litany can be prayed in Latin or the vernacular.

In his letter, Cardinal Sarah noted where each invocation should be added, using the Latin formulations. "Mater misericordiae," which means, *"Mother of mercy,"* should be placed after "Mater Ecclesiae." "Mater spei," which means *"Mother of hope,"* should follow "Mater divinae gratiae," and *"Solacium migrantium,"* which means "Comfort of migrants," should follow "Refugium peccatorum."
