This new ministry team will be involved in preparing the Church for the liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, Holy Week, Easter and Ordinary Time.



What would Jesus do?



But Jesus refuses to consider forgiveness in terms of what's reasonable or even humanly possible. When Jesus tells his parable about the servant forgiven a great debt, there is no discussion at all of how long to forgive someone who offends, or even how to do it, period. The emphasis in the story is not on the mechanics of forgiveness but only on the motivation. We forgive our fellow human beings, umpteen times seven times, not because they deserve it but because we ourselves have been forgiven a king's ransom.

"How much and how long am I expected to forgive?"—only entangles us in a numbers game, meting out pardon by the spoonful. That may seem reasonable. But God's forgiveness, which comes first, is hardly reasonable, and it is by God's standard alone that we are to measure our own obligation to forgive. If we approach the daunting task of forgiveness from the human side of the equation, we may never find the heart for the job. But if we begin at the beginning, in the quiet contemplation of how human history floats on an ocean of divine mercy that has no beginning or end, we may find ourselves buoyed along on the current of forgiveness despite ourselves. As far as Jesus is concerned, this is the whole of forgiveness in a nutshell: Our obligation matches the largess we have received, which is incalculable. Never mind ruminating on who did what to whom and how often. Yes, there may be pain and anger and certainly there can be just cause for grievance. Jesus doesn't argue those points. But gnawing on those components will not free us to do the one thing we are expected to do as servants relieved of all our debts, and that's to forgive our debtors, free and clear.

Through Jesus, our Father freely gives us His gift of everlasting life. He asks that we live lives of great gratitude, forgiving our

sisters and brothers from our heart.

Justification has been merited for us by the Passion of Christ. It is granted us through Baptism. It conforms us to the righteousness of God, who justifies us. It has for its goal the glory of God and of Christ, and the gift of eternal life. It is the most excellent work of God's mercy. (CCC2020)

Many of Jesus' parables help us understand the personality of the Father in hopes that we will imitate Him as well as following the example of Jesus. The Holy Spirit can enkindle in us the desire to live a more Godly life. Through prayer—especially the Lord's Prayer—our hearts can learn to trust in healthy humility, open to receiving and giving in turn great forgiveness and mercy.

Praying to our Father should develop in us the will to become like Him and foster in us a humble trusting heart. (CCC 2800)







Our Mission Statement

Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross

This feast celebrates a double anniversary. In Jerusalem, Constantine erected a round church, the *Anastasis*, above the empty grave of Jesus, a basilica, the *Martyrium*; and in the square between

the two churches, a shrine, *Calvarium*, marking the place of the crucifixion. Dedicated in 335, they were destroyed by the Persians in 614. The two churches were rebuilt by Patriarch Modestus of Jerusalem in c. 626, but were later destroyed by the Muslims in 1009. The present church of the Holy Sepulcher, rebuilt by the Crusaders, was dedicated in 1149. Today also commemorates the discovery of the Lord's cross by the empress, St. Helena in 320.

What right do we have to limit the amount and degree of forgiveness we show to others when we are so desperately in need of it ourselves? In not wanting someone who hurt us to downplay or forget the gravity of their wrong, we cling to anger, resentment, and wrath as a way of maintaining control. It is a way to acknowledge and express our deep hurt. We fail to realize that in doing so we hold ourselves hostage to these destructive feelings and actually become mired in the bondage of sin. All we gain is further alienation from ourselves, others, and especially God. We are no longer free but tethered to all of this unresolved negativity. Don't we really want to let it go? The fact is that we need to.

A good self-reflective posture will quickly show us that when the shoe is on the other foot and we are the ones in need of forgiveness, we desire it above anything else. This is especially true with our relationship with God. It is hypocritical to want one thing for ourselves and something else for

another. Yet, many act in precisely this way.



Perhaps we think that in offering forgiveness, even for the most grievous of wrongs, somehow excuses the person of their wrong and makes it almost acceptable. This is what makes revenge, retaliation, and punishment so attractive. We see forgiveness as being an eraser that easily

wipes away the offense without consequence. Or, we may believe that in offering forgiveness I must somehow forget the wrong and open myself as a victim of even greater possible hurts in the future. In fact, forgiving my sister or brother of their wrongful actions or attitudes involves none of this. It does not erase anything or position me vulnerably as a doormat to be walked on.

Forgiveness is an act of freedom that restores honest dialogue, shares true, and heartfelt feelings and acknowledges the consequences of an action. It admits that the wrong has caused a hurt that must be healed and squarely positions responsibility on the offender. The act of forgiveness recognizes our sinfulness and brokenness. It also admits that the most saintly among us is capable of doing very grave and deep harm to another person. It sees that we all can be victims of our passions and works in progress that deserve unlimited chances to get it right. With forgiveness, I release myself from the bonds of negativity and pursue a path of restoration, wholeness, and healing. I do not forget the wrong nor do I dismiss it. Sometimes, we have to stay far away from the one who hurt us. But we can still heal internally and be free.

For the one who wants to be forgiven and the one who needs offer forgiveness, the journey can be an adventure in learning what brought us to this place and what is needed to move forward. This is exactly how God treats us. Why would we not want to do the same for others?

Can Catholics be cremated?

As the practice of cremation becomes more and more common, it's important to know what the Church asks of families who have chosen this for a loved one who has died.



As the US Bishops observe on their website, "Ideally, if a

family chooses cremation, the cremation would take place some time after the Funeral Mass, so that there can be an opportunity for the Vigil for the Deceased in the presence of the body." However, if cremation takes places before the Funeral Mass, the cremated remains can be present at the Funeral Mass and the appendix to the Order of Christian Funerals provides adaptations for the texts and rituals that are part of the Funeral Mass and the Committal.

The primary concern is that the cremated remains should be treated with the same respect given to any human remains. The Order of Christian Funerals instructs, "This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, and the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires" (no. 417).

It is becoming more and more common for parishes or diocese-sponsored cemeteries to include columbaria to house cremated remains in a way that respects Church teaching, allowing family and friends the opportunity to honor the remains of the one they have lost with dignity, reverence, and care.

Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows

Tuesday, September 15th

Mary is certainly a model of suffering. As she stood lovingly and courageously at the foot of the Cross, accompanying her Son in his agony and Death, she offered her anguish in union with his for the salvation of all mankind.



By the 14th century the sorrows of Mary numbered 7: the presentation of Jesus in the Temple, the flight into Egypt, Jesus being lost in Jerusalem, the meeting of Mary and Jesus on the way to Calvary, the crucifixion, the taking down of Jesus' body from the cross, and his burial.

¿Qué haría Jesús?

Ojalá hubiera una solución sencilla al problema del perdón. Pero incluso Pedro, que tenía a Jesús frente a él

en persona todos los días, no parecía saber qué haría Jesús la octava vez que un hermano pudiera pecar contra él. Pedro experimenta los límites de la paciencia y la tolerancia humanas en sus propias relaciones. Quiere saber cuánto tiempo debe soportar una persona verdaderamente buena el abuso de su caridad.

Pero Jesús se niega a considerar el perdón en términos de lo que es razonable o incluso humanamente posible. Cuando Jesús cuenta su parábola sobre el siervo perdonado de una gran deuda, no hay ninguna discusión sobre cuánto tiempo se debe perdonar a alguien que ofende, o incluso cómo hacerlo. El énfasis en la historia no está en la mecánica del perdón sino solo en la motivación. Perdonamos a nuestros semejantes, incontables siete veces, no porque se lo merezcan, sino porque a nosotros mismos se nos ha perdonado el rescate de un rey.

"¿Cuánto tiempo se espera que perdone?" - solo nos enredamos en juegos de números, otorgando perdón a cucharadas. Eso puede parecer razonable. Pero el perdón de Dios, que es lo primero, no es razonable, y es solo por el estándar de Dios que debemos medir nuestra propia obligación de perdonar. Si abordamos la abrumadora tarea del perdón desde el lado humano de la ecuación, es posible que nunca encontremos el corazón para el trabajo. Pero si comenzamos por el principio, en la tranquila contemplación de cómo la historia humana flota en un océano de misericordia divina que no tiene principio ni fin, podemos encontrarnos impulsados por la corriente del perdón a pesar de nosotros mismos. Para Jesús, esto es todo el perdón en pocas palabras: Nuestra obligación coincide con la generosidad que hemos recibido, que es incalculable. No importa reflexionar sobre quién hizo qué a quién y con qué frecuencia. Sí, puede haber dolor e ira y ciertamente puede haber una causa justa para el agravio. Jesús no discute estos puntos. Pero a pesar de esos componentes no nos liberará para hacer la única cosa que se espera que hagamos como siervos liberados de todas nuestras deudas, y es perdonar a nuestros deudores, libre y claramente.

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
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
